BENGALURU SCHOOLCHILDREN DEMAND SAFER ROADS IN CARMELARAM



engaluru, August 25, 2025: Fed up with daily commutes on pothole-ridden, half-constructed roads, schoolchildren from Carmelaram and Chikkabellandur have appealed to Deputy Chief Minister D.K. Shivakumar for urgent road repairs. The students highlighted the unsafe conditions of key stretches such as Gear School Road, Varthur Main Road, Carmelaram Railway Station Road, and the incomplete 100ft Road through handwritten letters and

The children also drew attention to the long-stalled Carmelaram railway overbridge project, which has worsened congestion and heightened commuter risks. On a postcard, a Class 3 student wrote: "Every day, we are scared to travel on these roads. Sometimes, we get hurt on the bus. Please fix them before more accidents happen."

Roads That Endanger Daily Life

Residents said that despite Carmelaram merging with the BBMP in 2008, the area still lacks basic infrastructure like proper roads, drains, and traffic systems. The 5-km stretch from Outer Ring Road (ORR) to Carmelaram. which should take minutes, often takes up to 1.5 hours due to craters, narrow lanes, and waterlogging.

The situation worsens during the monsoon. Tech professional Preethi Aswani, 45, described spending ₹200-₹250 on cabs for short distances as autos refuse to ply while her elderly parents struggle to commute. She recalled fatal accidents in the area and criticized officials for relying on caution boards instead of permanent

Voices from the Community

Citizen activist Jose Thazhathuveettil of Carmelaram Unite blamed unchecked urban growth without infrastructure planning. "Despite being under the BBMP for over 15 years, roads remain incomplete. Authorities must prioritise CDP roads to ease congestion and improve safety," he said.

Students also shared vivid experiences:

- "The 100ft road has been incomplete for three years. causing accidents." — Ezzah C.T., Class 10 • "Our bus hit a pothole, and my friend was badly hurt."
- Ojas Haswani, Class 3 • "Our buses shake so much that students fall." —
- Catherine Antony, Class 7 • "I got hurt when the bus braked suddenly on potholes."

KARNATAKA'S MORAL EDUCATION CURRICULUM TO COVER 10 CORE VALUES IN STATE SCHOOLS

engaluru | August 28, 2025 In a significant move towards holistic education, the Karnataka state government is all set to roll out a new moral and value education curriculum across its government schools, covering critical issues ranging from cyberbullying and digital safety to climate consciousness and gender equality.

The initiative, first announced during the Belagavi Assembly session in December 2024 by School Education Minister Madhu Bangarappa, will officially launch in the 2025-26 academic year. Speaking in the legislature last week, the minister confirmed that the value education books for Grades 1 to 10 are nearly ready.

10 Core Values for a Holistic Future

The curriculum is built around 10 core values, which will be introduced progressively through age-appropriate stories and activities. While the primary themes remain consistent across grades, the depth and context will vary based on the students' maturity.

Some of the key themes include:

- EMPATHY AND COMPASSION • EMOTIONAL INTELLIGENCE
- DIGITAL AND PHYSICAL SAFETY • CLIMATE RESPONSIBILITY
- GENDER UNDERSTANDING AND EQUALITY
- SCIENTIFIC TEMPER AND INNOVATION
- READING HABITS AND CRITICAL THINKING

For example, the concept of safety evolves across grade levels. Students in Grades 1 and 2 will learn about body safety and personal boundaries, while older students will explore road safety, digital safety, and even financial



Similarly, emotional intelligence will be introduced early through lessons on self-awareness and identifying emotions, and will expand into emotional regulation—such as handling

anger, fear, and sadness—in higher classes.


A Modern Approach to Moral Science

This marks a significant update to the traditional "moral science" classes, aligning them with contemporary social challenges and global citizenship values. Topics like cyberbullying prevention, gender-based violence, and climate change awareness are key highlights of the revamped syllabus.

The curriculum also encourages volunteering, community involvement, and respect for public property, reinforcing the importance of civic duty and social responsibility among students.

With over 49,000 government schools and more than 49 lakh students, the Department of School Education and Literacy is preparing for a large-scale implementation Officials hope that the programme will not only instill moral values but also equip students with life skills essential for a rapidly changing world.

As more parents explore these schools, Bengaluru continues strengthening its reputation as a city that embraces


